



### **CREATE A CURRENCY**

What is currency? Currency is the money used in a country and usually has coins and paper. Most countries have a form of currency. For example, in Canada we use dollars, in Europe there are euros, and in Mexico, you'll find pesos. On Canadian money, you'll see images of people and animals. What else can you see? Imagine you are the leader of a new country or a planet.


- What would you use for currency?
- What would it look like and what are its individual values? Think about the shape, colours and materials.
- Remember there are two sides on paper money and two sides on coins.
